Richmond Chapter hosts Patrick Henry speech event

The Richmond Chapter hosted the Virginia Society's commemoration of the 246th anniversary of Patrick Henry's, "Give me liberty or give me death," speech.

Henry's impassioned plea convinced the Virginia Convention, being held at Richmond's St. John's Church, to vote in favor of his resolution to raise militia in opposition to King George III and ignited revolutionary sentiment across the colonies.



Virginia Society President Jeff Thomas welcomed attendees from multiple states and organizations to the virtual event. Richmond Chapter President Bill Haskins emceed. The observance was highlighted by actors from St. John's Church taking attendees on a guided tour of the building and sharing the background and significance of the speech.





Richmond Chapter hosts Virginia Society monument dedication

Richmond's historic Shockoe Hill Cemetery is the final resting place of many prominent people. Included among them are former U.S. Secretary of State and U.S. Supreme Court Chief Justice John Marshall and the *Hercules of the Revolution* Peter Franciso. These Revolutionary War veterans are joined by at least 18 others who are laid to rest in the cemetery.

When it was determined the 2020 SAR National Congress would be held in Richmond, it seemed entirely fitting to honor these brave men who contributed so much to our freedom. Dedicating a new monument to their memory was going to be one of the Congress' main events.



But, when the 2020 Congress was cancelled due to the COVID pandemic, the dedication had to wait. The time for the ceremony finally arrived in May. The Virginia Society marked the dedication as a state event., which was hosted and supported by the Richmond Chapter.

This marked just the second in-person meeting since before the pandemic began. The gathering allowed for the induction of new members and some long due recognition.








Patriot ancestor spotlight

John served as a private in Captain Thomas Ballard's company of the North Carolina Line.




