
Virginia SAR President Ernie Coggins reported Virginia's great success, leadership and numerous awards at the 2023 National SAR Congress in Orlando, FL.

Richmond SAR grave marking coming November 5

The Richmond SAR is honored to sponsor a grave marking and plaque dedication to Major Joseph Eggleston, who was "Lighthorse Harry" Lee's second-in-command.

His storied career includes his rapid rise from pay master - to lieutenant - to captain, in just over two years. Captured at Elizabethtown, he became a prisoner of war and was later exchanged to return to service in Lee's cavalry.

Major Eggleston was recognized for gallantry at Guilford, Augusta and Eutaw Springs, after which he rose to the rank of major. He went on to serve in the Virginia State Legislature and the United States Congress.



The event will take place at 2 p.m. Sunday, November 5, at St. John's "Grub Hill" Church, in Amelia County. See this calendar event for full details and to register.



New Richmond SAR logo

The National SAR determined the logo featuring the minuteman depicting the A in SAR was no longer valid for use by states or chapters. So, the Richmond SAR adopted a new official logo, in which the central design features the statue atop the Virginia Washington Monument, located on the State Capitol grounds.

In what is, perhaps, an even more appropriate representation of the Richmond SAR, the new logo links the quintessential leader of the American Revolution with an unmistakable Richmond landmark.

Richmond SAR upcoming projects

Funds raised by the sale of the challenge coins will be used for chapter activities. Here's a preview of some local historic commemorations planned for 2024.

Susannah Bolling historical marker

As presented by local author Libby McNamee at the March 2023 meeting, Susannah Bolling's home in present-day Hopewell was used by British General Cornwallis as his headquarters. While there, Susannah overheard him and his officers planning to capture General Lafayette, who was headquartered at the Halfway House, located on present-day Route 1, just north of 288.

Susannah crept out of her home in the middle of the night, mounted a horse and rode to the Halfway House to warn Lafayette. He made his escape and avoided capture thanks to Susannah's brave ride. The Richmond SAR is working to place a historical marker at the Halfway House in honor of her heroism and great contribution to the cause of liberty.



The Berkeley Plantation Shipyard

Berkeley Plantation is well-known as the site of the first Thanksgiving, the home of Declaration of Independence Signer and Virginia Governor Benjamin Harrison V and the site of the first playing of *Taps*. However, it's not widely known that Berkeley was also the location of an industrious shipyard that built 18 warships for the patriot cause in the American Revolution.

The Richmond SAR is working to place a historical marker at Berkely commemorating the site of such a significant contributor to our Nation's independence.


